## EUROPEAN UNION

### 1,000 Days of Ukrainian Resilience

European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen commemorated 1,000 days of Ukraine's resistance to Russia's invasion, praising its resilience and pledging unwavering support. The EU and G7 committed €50 billion and \$50 billion in aid, with frozen Russian assets funding military production and energy repairs. Von der Leyen also announced €65 million for a school meal initiative by Ukraine's First Lady, highlighting the importance of safeguarding Ukraine's children and future. She reaffirmed Ukraine's EU aspirations, applauding its progress amid war and declaring "Your freedom is our freedom. Our Union is your home."

## HEALTH

### Neurotechnology & the EU: Balancing Innovation & Ethics

The rapid evolution of neurotechnologies is testing existing EU legal frameworks, particularly regarding mental privacy, data consent and ethical governance. An ICFG event highlighted the need for a comprehensive, proactive EU strategy to govern these technologies, emphasizing mental privacy, individual autonomy and freedom of thought. While some experts argued current rights suffice, all agreed on the importance of integrating ethics early, engaging diverse stakeholders and fostering responsible innovation. The debate underscored the urgency of regulating brain data, addressing potential gaps and ensuring equitable access to neurotechnological advancements.

## ENERGY

### EU and Member States Boost Renewable Hydrogen Investments

The European Commission, Spain, Lithuania and Austria announced significant funding for renewable hydrogen projects under the European Hydrogen Bank's 'Auctions-as-a-Service' scheme. The initiative combines €1.2 billion from the EU Innovation Fund with over €700 million in national funding, mobilizing around €2 billion to advance clean hydrogen production. Spain allocated up to €400 million, Lithuania €36 million and Austria €400 million, aligning with their national energy and climate goals. The scheme supports hydrogen projects with a 10-year fixed premium to bridge the cost gap between production and market prices, fostering decarbonization and industrial competitiveness across the EU.

## DIGITAL

### EU and Singapore Partner on AI Safety

The EU and Singapore have signed an Administrative Arrangement to enhance cooperation between the EU's AI Office and Singapore's AI Safety Institute. This partnership aims to promote safe, trustworthy and human-centric AI through joint testing, research and knowledge-sharing. Building on the 2023 EU-Singapore Digital Partnership, it focuses on addressing challenges posed by general-purpose AI models and advancing best practices and standards. Margrethe Vestager highlighted the shared goal of ensuring AI aligns with human values while minimizing risks, stressing that knowledge exchange would foster safer innovation. This agreement strengthens EU-Singapore collaboration on AI safety.

## HEALTH

### Shaping the Future of Europe's Health Union

The 2024-2029 POLITICO Health Care Summit, held in Brussels on November 19-20, brought together policymakers, industry experts and medical professionals to discuss the future of Europe's Health Union under new EU leadership. Amid challenges such as an ageing population, workforce shortages, drug access and technological advancements, the summit explored key issues including healthcare access, competitiveness and preparedness for emerging health crises. Focused on innovation in digital health and post-COVID strategies, the summit aimed to shape Europe's healthcare landscape, ensuring it remains resilient and future-ready.

## EUROPEAN UNION

### Ribera Confirmed as EU Commissioner Amid Political Blame Game

Spain's Teresa Ribera was approved as European Commissioner for Competition and Vice-President for a Clean, Fair and Competitive Transition, despite opposition from her country's Partido Popular (PP), which criticized her handling of the Valencia floods. Ribera countered by blaming the regional PP-led government for response failures. The European People's Party (EPP) ultimately backed Ribera after she addressed parliament, overriding PP objections. The approval followed complex negotiations, including a quid pro quo supporting far-right Italian candidate Raffaele Fitto, reflecting ideological tensions in the EU's leadership process.
